# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As we conclude the 2024–25 season, I extend my sincere thanks to all our dedicated club members for their continued service. Your commitment ensures Narrabeen Beach SLSC remains a vital part of the community. I also acknowledge the ongoing support from the Sydney Northern Beaches Branch throughout this season.

## LIFESAVING

This season, 92 active patrolling members volunteered an impressive 3,872 hours on the beach. Their efforts resulted in:

- 5 rescues
- 114 first aid treatments
- 259 preventative actions

These results demonstrate our club's unwavering commitment to beach safety.

Our patrol roster was made up of 10 experienced patrols, coordinated by Jacob Hall, our Director of Lifesaving and the Lifesaving Committee. Despite a reduced number of patrolling members, the team maintained our high standards of lifesaving service.

Our Education team worked tirelessly to ensure members remained proficient and to train new lifesavers. This season, 38 new awards were issued across various lifesaving disciplines, strengthening our operational capability.

## NIPPERS

Thanks to the commitment of our Director of Youth Development, Kristy Andrews, and the support of Age Managers and volunteers, our Nippers had a successful season with more opportunities to get in the water this season. The enthusiasm



and energy of our junior members continue to be a highlight of the club.

We're excited to see our young members developing their skills and confidence, and we look forward to their continued growth within the club.

## SURF SPORTS

Our competitors proudly represented Narrabeen Beach at local, Branch, State, and National carnivals. A special congratulations to Masters Competitor, Luke Alcock, who won gold in the beach sprint and silver in the beach flag events at the Australian Titles.

We also successfully hosted our traditional Junior Beach Carnival in January 2025, thanks to the efforts of our dedicated volunteers. These events continue to showcase our club spirit and community engagement.

## SYDNEY NORTHERN BEACHES BRANCH INVOLVEMENT

Narrabeen Beach SLSC members continue to contribute beyond our own club, taking on important roles at the Branch level. These include assessors, duty officers, UAV operators, and support team members. Their service reflects the strength and generosity of our club community.

# LIFE SAVING REPORT

What a fantastic season!

I'd like to extend my sincere thanks to each and every member for the contributions you've made to our club this season. Your dedication, both on the beach and behind the scenes, has helped keep our beach safe and the lights running. Your time, effort, and commitment does not go unnoticed.

## GEAR INSPECTION

We kicked off the season with our annual gear inspection and I'd like to thank everyone who came down and helped get everything ready.

Lifesaving is more than just spending time on the sand each weekend, It involves countless hours of preparation, organising logistics, maintaining and procuring vital equipment and resources.

We are fortunate to have some impressive equipment, and the Board is continuing to invest in this space by purchasing much needed lifesaving gear such as two additional IRB motors which will be operational for the start of the 2025-26 season.

## SEASON UPDATE

Looking at the numbers, we collectively logged an impressive 3,872 hours across patrols, water safety, and support for events like our annual Ocean Swim.

It was as busy as ever on the beach this season with more than 85,000 visitors enjoying a trip to Narrabeen Beach. During the season we logged over 259 preventative actions, and pleasingly we had only five rescues which demonstrates the effectiveness and preparedness of our patrolling teams.

Our preventative work has paid off; however, I am very proud to have seen the positive outcomes of the rescues that we were involved in, particularly the successful resuscitation of a Sydney Kneeboarder's Club member back in December 2024. Thanks again to the efforts of Matt Murphy and others who helped on the day. Your actions truly embody the dedication and skill that define our club spirit.

We contended with some adverse weather this season, evolving beach conditions and more bluebottle stings than I can count. Patrol 7 ended up running a taxi service, ferrying patients to and from the hot showers!





## NEIGHBOURLY SUPPORT

In addition to monitoring our designated lifesaving zone, the club has been providing IRB support for South Narrabeen due to coastal erosion impacting their capabilities in the water – a challenge that we welcome. I anticipate that this will continue into the 2025-26 season and strengthen our relationships with neighbouring clubs.

## NEW MEMBERS

I want to take this opportunity to welcome our new members this season. To those who gained their Bronze Medallion - congratulations on this massive achievement! Many have continued their skills journey by taking on higher awards such as IRB Crew, Silver Medallion IRB Driver, and Silver Medallion Patrol Captain. We appreciate your ongoing commitment and giving back to the club through skills development.

As this was my first season in the Director's role, I've quickly learnt that there are plenty of areas to tackle, particularly around rostering, communications and integrating new digital platforms with our existing systems. Whilst the learning curve is steep, I'm excited about the opportunities ahead and look forward to working alongside all of you in the years to come.

Lifesaving at Narrabeen Beach is always evolving, and I can't wait to see what the future holds for our club.

## ROBERT BUCKTON

### 25 YEARS PATROL SERVICE

Robert was introduced to surf lifesaving via the nipper program at Narrabeen Beach SLSC. From 1996 to 1998, Robert undertook the Nipper Treasurer role, before becoming Nipper Chairman from 1999 to 2003.

Robert attained his Bronze Medallion at Narrabeen Beach SLSC in the year 2000. In the 25 years since, he has clocked up 1,180 volunteer patrol hours to date.

In the following years, Robert completed five other surf lifesaving awards.

For a 10-year period from 2004 to 2014, Robert was the Director of Surf Sports. During this time, he was also the Downwind Ski Organiser from 2009 to 2012.

Robert's commitment to surf lifesaving earned him a Narrabeen Beach SLSC Distinguished Service Award in 2008. He was also awarded Narrabeen Beach SLSC Life Membership in 2011.

In 2017, Robert was awarded the National Medal, Australia's

most awarded civilian medal. It recognises long and diligent service in organisations that are dedicated to protecting life and property at a degree of risk to their members and are awarded to those individuals who risk their lives or safety to protect or assist the community in enforcement of the law or in times of emergency or natural disaster.

Robert continues to be an active patrolling member at Narrabeen Beach SLSC.

## ALEX BUCKTON

### 25 YEARS PATROL SERVICE

Alex was introduced to Narrabeen Beach SLSC as a nipper in the Under 5 age group in 1993.

After progressing through the nipper program, Alex undertook his Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) in 2000, before achieving his Bronze Medallion in 2002.

Throughout his past 25 years of service, Alex has attained seven other surf lifesaving awards.

Since 2009, Alex has undertaken the role of Patrol Captain at Narrabeen Beach SLSC.

From 2015 to 2024, Alex was also an SLSSNB Support Ski Operator.

In 2023, Alex was awarded a National Medal for his sustained service and commitment to Surf Life Saving. This is Australia's most awarded civilian medal.

To date, Alex has patrolled 1,330 hours over the past 25 years. He continues to be an active patrolling member.

It was around the early 1990s when Gloria (David's late wife) wanted their children to do nippers,

At the time, the family was involved with the C3 Church and it was convenient that the Narrabeen Beach nippers started later than other clubs. It meant they were able to go straight from Church to nippers. It was the start of a long and rewarding association with the Narrabeen Beach SLSC.

David took on the role of Nippers Registrar for a two-year period, before achieving his Bronze Medallion in the year 2000. In the years to follow, David attained six more surf lifesaving awards.

He has volunteered for 1,449 patrol hours, to date. During this period, David also undertook a Patrol Captain role for a 10-year period. In recognition of his outstanding commitment, David was awarded a Distinguished Service Award in 2010.

From 2011 to 2012, David was Vice-President, Finance and Administration for Narrabeen Beach SLSC.

In 2016, David was acknowledged for his dedication to surf lifesaving

by being awarded the prestigious Life Membership of Narrabeen Beach SLSC.

From 2017 to 2020, David undertook the role of Director, Finance and Administration at the club.

In 2018, David was awarded the National Medal, Australia's most awarded civilian medal that recognises long and diligent service, served for at least 15 years.

## COMMUNITY EDUCATION PROGRAM OF THE YEAR (CPR & AED AWARENESS SESSION)

In December 2024, during a Bronze Assessment at Narrabeen Beach, trainers and assessors from a number of different clubs were involved in a CPR emergency that saw the successful resuscitation of a member of the public who had suffered a sudden medical episode during a Sydney Kneeboarders Club competition. The individual made a full recovery thanks to the quick response and teamwork of all involved.

This incident highlighted the importance of having bystanders equipped with life-saving CPR and AED knowledge.

After the incident, Narrabeen Beach SLSC approached the Sydney Kneeboarders Club to offer a tailored CPR and AED awareness session. This offer was driven by the belief that prompt intervention can save lives, and that clubs like theirs could benefit greatly from having members with these vital skills.

The training was delivered voluntarily by Matt and Jodie Murphy.

Education and training of members is an important aspect in surf lifesaving, as members need to be skilled and ready to perform in an emergency, which is why we run our annual proficiency checks. # YOUTH DEVELOPMENT REPORT

What an exciting nipper season 2024-2025 was!

I loved seeing the children and parents reconnect with old friends, make new ones, and learn some surf safety along the way. As always, the nipper season wouldn't be possible without the dedication of parents and volunteers who run the program. Thank you to those families who gave their time to assist in running nippers, from beach set-up, canteen & BBQ duties to Age Managers who provided a safe environment for our nippers to learn and grow.

## SEASON REVIEW

The weather gods were kind to us this season, blessing us with sunshine and small surf, allowing us to undertake nippers at the beach most Sunday mornings. We only had a couple of occasions when we needed to head to the lake due to larger surf, and once due to some unwelcome visitors we didn't wish to swim with!

We had a special visit from the Surf Life Saving Drone, and the children got to view Narrabeen beach from afar and watch themselves on screen as the drone returned to the beach. We managed to have a lot of board time this season, which was great fun! A massive thank you to the patrols every Sunday morning and the extra parents who had completed their Bronze to assist with water safety. Nippers can't enjoy the water and learn valuable surf skills without your assistance.





We tried to mix things up here and there, not only completing activities within the children's age groups but also bringing the entire group together to enjoy some wider activities where the older nippers assisted the younger ones. We learned about blue bottles, tides, rips, big surf, where the safest place to swim is, DRSABC, all while having fun with friends. Finally, I would like to announce our 2024-25 Top Tuffs who completed six or more swims:

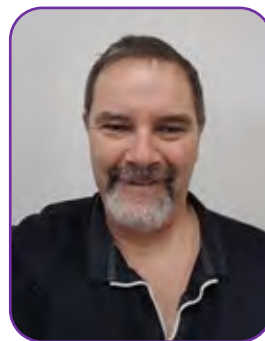

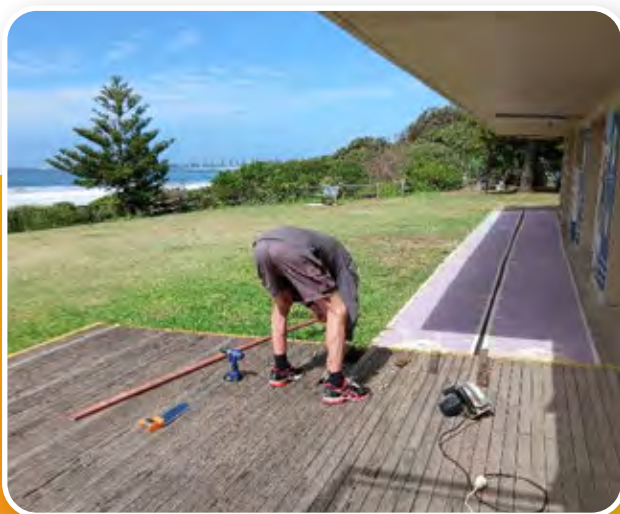

# FINANCIAL REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present the annual financial statements for Narrabeen Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. for the year ending 30 April 2025.

## Gross Surplus

This year we have achieved a Gross Surplus of \$160,382 (2024: \$137,952). The Gross Surplus includes net income from all grants, sponsorships, donations, Sunday BBQ/kiosk takings, venue hire, bar trading, gym hire and club events. An increase in trading revenue is reflected.

## Total Expenditure

Total expenditure including interest costs and depreciation was \$184,922, an increase of \$11,205 from the prior year, reflected in the increase in Gross Surplus from trading.

## Net Comprehensive Deficit

The net comprehensive deficit of \$24,540 has decreased from last year's deficit of \$35,765.

## Cash Position

Cash and cash equivalents at the end of the 2025 financial year were \$25,856 (2024: \$43,039).

## Club Solvency (Current Position)

The current position of the club (Current Assets less Current Liabilities) was \$12,404 (2024: \$27,718). This reflects the club's ability to pay debts as they fall due.

## Member Loans

Currently there is one member loan outstanding. No additional loans were provided during the year. The member loan commenced being repaid this financial year and was reduced by \$5,000.

## In Summary

Overall, the 2024-2025 financial year saw an increase in function room trading, with an increase to gross revenue of \$31,662.

Sunday BBQ kiosk gross revenues were down \$905, reflected in a smaller nipper program.

A return to the Ocean Swim and successful Junior Carnival, as well as assistance from the Rotary organised Beach to Beach supported overall revenue and a great member engagement and support.

The club continues to rely on the ongoing support from our key sponsors such as Dee Why RSL which has been vital to the club's financial viability. State and Federal government support has also been crucial to assist with ongoing costs. Pharo Cleaning continue as a sponsor also for this season.

Special thanks also to our new sponsors - MSC, Amazon Power ACAI, Platypus Conveyancing, and Sujitra Thai Massage, combining with sponsorship and vouchers greatly received this financial year, going towards equipping patrols and surf sports teams.

We look forward to also working with

4 Pines Brewing Co and Narrabeen Sands who have come on board with sponsorship agreements, and member and club offers for the year ahead.

NSW Office of Sport, Surf Lifesaving Club Facility Grant for \$47,294 (ex GST) was awarded for solar panel and battery installation on 26 March 2025. RESINC solar were the appointed contractor with their grant matching program to subsidise the large installation. We look forward to a reduction in power bills in coming years.

During the year the club managed to further pay off the external CBA loan which has reduced from \$171,996 to \$110,572 at the end of the financial year and is on track to be repaid by the start of patrols in 2026-27, which is exciting for the club's future.

Special thank you to all who assist with the finance functions of the club including the Board, Finance Committee, Administration team and the Functions Coordinator.

# NEW SOLAR INSTALLATION

As mentioned in the Finance Report, Narrabeen Beach SLSC was fortunate to receive a grant of \$47,294 from the NSW Office of Sport for solar panels and battery installation.

Installation of the new system commenced on 2 June 2025, following the removal of old solar panels which were no longer operational. We were most grateful to Kennards Hire for donating the scissor lift hire, to remove the old solar panels.

The club appointed contractors, RESINC, to install the new solar panels, working in well with their grant matching program to subsidise a large installation.

We look forward to our superior new solar panels serving the club for many years to come, while also providing substantial cost savings.

The technical specifications of our new solar system are as follows:

- 39.6kW Rooftop Solar
- 90 x 440w Tedlar backed panels, which incorporate the highest salt mist corrosion rating
- 12kw Anker hybrid 3-phase inverter
- 1x 15kw Sungrow String inverter
- 30kW Battery Storage in 20kw and 10kw modules.
- Planned output - 53812 kWh annual energy product (year 1)

If you are considering installing solar panels at home or in the workplace, keep in mind that RESINC are providing our club with a generous referral fee on all solar installs with the mention of Narrabeen Beach SLSC.

# Notes of the Financial Statements

## Narrabeen Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. For the year ended 30 April 2025

### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements cover Narrabeen Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as an individual entity. Narrabeen Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in New South Wales under the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW).

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the club's constitution. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

#### Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

#### Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

## Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

## Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

## Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

## Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

## Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

## Financial Instruments

### *Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition*

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

### *Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets*

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Classifications are determined by both:

- The entity's business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

### *Subsequent measurement of financial assets*

#### *Financial assets at amortised cost*

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposit that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

#### *Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)*

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

#### *Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)*

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividends from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

### *Impairment of Financial assets*

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial

assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

#### *Trade and other receivables*

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

#### *Classification and measurement of financial liabilities*

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

## **Leases**

For any new contracts entered into on or after 1 January 2020, the Association considers whether a contract is, or contains a lease. A lease is defined as 'a contract, or part of a contract, that conveys the right to use an asset (the underlying asset) for a period of time in exchange for consideration'.

To apply this definition the Association assesses whether the contract meets three key evaluations which are whether:

- the contract contains an identified asset, which is either explicitly identified in the contract or implicitly specified by being identified at the time the asset is made available to the Association
- the Association has the right to obtain substantially all of the economic benefits from use of the identified asset throughout the period of use, considering its rights within the defined scope of the contract
- the Association has the right to direct the use of the identified asset throughout the period of use. The Association assesses whether it has the right to direct 'how and for what purpose' the asset is used throughout the period of use.

#### *Measurement and recognition of leases as a lessee*

At lease commencement date, the Association recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which is made up of the initial measurement of the lease liability, any initial direct costs incurred by the Association, an estimate of any costs to dismantle and remove the asset at the end of the lease, and any lease payments made in advance of the lease commencement date (net of any incentives received).

The Association depreciates the right-of-use assets on a straight-line basis from the lease commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term. The Association also assesses the right-of-use asset for impairment when such indicators exist.

At the commencement date, the Association measures the lease liability at the present value of the lease payments unpaid at that date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease if that rate is readily available or the Association's incremental borrowing rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are made up of fixed payments (including in substance fixed), variable payments based on an index or rate, amounts expected to be payable under a residual value guarantee and payments arising from options reasonably certain to be exercised.

Subsequent to initial measurement, the liability will be reduced for payments made and increased for interest. It is remeasured to reflect any reassessment or modification, or if there are changes in in-substance fixed payments.

When the lease liability is remeasured, the corresponding adjustment is reflected in the right-of-use asset, or profit and loss if the right-of-use asset is already reduced to zero.

The Association has elected to account for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets using the practical expedients. Instead of recognising a right-of-use asset and lease liability, the payments in relation to these are recognised as an expense in profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

On the statement of financial position, right-of-use assets have been included in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities have been included in finance liabilities.

## Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

## Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

## Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

## Significant management judgement in applying accounting policies

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgements, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

### *Estimation uncertainty*

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

### *Impairment*

In assessing impairment, management estimates the recoverable amount of each asset or cash-generating units, based on expected future cash flows and uses an interest rate to discount them. Estimation uncertainty relates to assumptions about future operating results and the determination of a suitable discount rate.

### *Useful lives of depreciable assets*

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical obsolescence that may change the utility of certain software and IT equipment.

#### *Inventories*

Management estimates the net realisable values of inventories, taking into account the most reliable evidence available at each reporting date. The future realisation of these inventories may be affected by future technology or other market-driven changes that may reduce future selling prices.

#### *Long service leave*

The liability for long service leave is recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

## Related Party Transactions

The Association's related parties include its key management personnel and related entities as described below. Unless otherwise stated, none of the transactions incorporate special terms and conditions and no guarantees were given or received. Outstanding balances are usually settled in cash.

#### *Transactions with related entities*

The Association had no transactions with related parties during the financial year.

#### *Transactions with key management personnel*

All key management personnel and volunteers are not compensated for holding office positions.
